How far should a Christian disciple's love extend? Are there not times when we might appropriately retaliate in response to a slight or attack? The recollection of who God is, and who we

are because we belong to God – the theme of all of this Sunday's readings – provides a challenging response.

Christian love is meant to be limitless. extending beyond the local communities and comfort zones of disciples, and embracing even enemies and evildoers. We are not to obliterate our opponents, nor to exact revenge, even if taking only an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth. The extent of a disciple's obligation exceeds treating others the way we would like to be treated. A disciple's love gives priority to the other's welfare first.

Disciples aim to emulate God's love, which is selfless, forgiving and unconditional. Such a love has called all creation into being, is ongoing, redemptive and life-giving. Such a love seeks the salvation of all. We can recognize all of this is the gifts of Jesus Christ, who announced the reign of God and freely gave himself up to death on a cross, and the indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit in the Church's midst. Crowned with such steadfast love and mercy, we strive to imitate the perfection – wholeness, holiness - of God with unreserved service of God and neighbor.

FR. PASTOR'S REFLECTION

This coming Wednesday we begin the holy and redemptive period of Lent. The external sign of our entry onto the path of repentance and conversion will be the placing of ashes on our foreheads and our undertaking of various forms of penitential practices.

The ashes remind us that everything earthly has arisen from the dust of the earth and will again turn into dust. Lent is a time of penance, fasting, penitential practices, and prayer, all of which serve our conversion and prepare our hearts for the Resurrection of Christ.

The Precepts of the Church call on all Catholics to receive the sacraments of reconciliation and Holy Communion at Easter, and to refrain from loud parties and festivities. Everyone is encouraged to take up penitential practices in the name of Christ. These could include giving up smoking, drinking, gossiping, or indulging in sweets; deciding to be kinder to one another, spending less time watching TV or using the internet. Choose one of these practices to fully experience the season of Lent. Do this for the crucified Christ.
