

Reflection

John and James' request to sit beside Jesus' right and left hand in glory is bold – some might say smug – but not unexpected. Throughout Mark's Gospel, the disciples have displayed an inability to understand the true nature of the kingdom of God, as well as the suffering and death that are the culmination of his ministry. His reply challenges expectations of leadership and political authority common in the first century AD.

Jesus overturns the standard conception of power as something that comes at the expense of the ruled. He also explodes the disciples' related assumption that their proximity to him bears certain special privileges that set them above others. The climax of today's Gospel is forceful: Jesus came to serve and not to be served. True leadership is servant leadership and those who are greatest in the kingdom must become like Mary Alice worked among the Polonia in various slaves, willing to suffer and even die, for the common good. The glory of the kingdom comes, not through violent means, but rather in and through the Cross.

Like the disciples, we are not immune to distorted conceptions of power and leadership. Living in the kingdom demands that we challenge our tendencies to side with those in power against the weak. The world will know us as true disciples of Jesus when we commit ourselves in loving service to the common good. Nicholas Olkovich;

- IN MEMORIAM -

Sister Alicia Kwiecień CSSF October 26, 1931 – October 13, 2021



Sister Mary Alice, born Krystyna Elzbieta Kwiecien, came into the world on October 26, 1931, in Radom, Poland.

Because of World War II, much of her studies were done at home. She graduated high school in 1950 from Gimnazium Krawiecko-Bieliznarskie, Poland, and attended Teacher's College in Warsaw, receiving a teaching certificate in 1960.

She was accepted into the postulancy in 1950 and received the Felician habit a year later along with the religious name Sister Mary Alice. She professed first vows on Aug. 22, 1952 and pronounced perpetual vows on Aug. 26, 1958.

After immigrating to Canada in 1966, Sister parishes in Southern Ontario. That's when she saw the necessity of inviting the laity to serve in a much broader range of roles in the parish, though it was a challenge among the Polonia who were accustomed to priests and sisters providing all leadership and much of the service within the parish.

She got the opportunity to put her belief into action when she applied for a position as pastoral minister of St. Maximilian Kolbe Parish in Mississauga, where she served from 1980-2007. Much of this time was spend working closely with Immigration Canada and coordinating the family sponsorship program, which would see some 6,000 Polish families arrive and settle in Canada in the '80s and '90s.

A dedicated catechist, sacristan, and friend to many, Sister Mary Alice loved being a Felician Sister, saying, "What brings me great joy is [that] being in our community is like being in a family – being with the sisters together in community has brought me much joy." May She rest in peace.

- OTHER NEWS -

Our church is open for in-person celebrations. All Masses are held indoors.

- For sacramental celebrations, in Step 3, there is no capacity limit for places of worship. However, physical distancing of 2 metres is still required between parishioners attending Mass who are not from the same household.
- Livestreaming of services and dispensation from physical participation in the Sunday Eucharist continues. The elderly, those with compromised immune systems or other health conditions should be encouraged to exercise extreme caution about any outings, including attendance at church.
- Funerals take place from Monday to Friday in the morning.
- Baptisms take place outside of Mass, on Saturday mornings.
- Meetings in parish halls or other indoor spaces are permitted in Step 3. Attendance may not exceed 50% of meeting space capacity. Participants must be masked and physically distanced. In addition, a sign-in sheet for meetings should be provided for the purposes of contact tracking. Meals and food services at meetings is discouraged at this time.
- Most up-to-date information is always communicated at the end of Mass. Please listen carefully.
- When leaving a message on the parish answering machine, remember to include your name and phone number.
- Local municipal by-laws remain in place the use of face masks inside all public places is still in effect, even for those who are fully vaccinated.
