The wise one is the one who asks

The hero, or rather the anti-hero, of today's Gospel is Herod. Who was he? A hypocrite and a man full of lies. He

wasn't able to engage in a dialogue with the Wise Men, which would open his eyes to the fact that the newborn king would not take his throne away. He could have used their knowledge to meet the King of kings, but he did not do it. Thus, he wasted his chance to go down in history as a great man with a big heart. Instead, he began plotting. A lie ended in a massive crime. This is a lesson for us. It is not wise to downplay the little lies in our lives. A fear of losing something, combined with a lie, can lead to terrible things!

The Wise Men had a completely different attitude. They were people seeking the truth. The greatest of their qualities was their humility, expressed in the question: Where is the newborn king of the Jews? This is also a lesson for us. We lack humility so much. These days, when we travel, we don't ask for directions. Why bother? After all, we have smartphones with free navigation systems. Why ask someone else for directions? Why stop and enter into dialogue? Why waste time? Everyone wants to be a wise man, but the wise man is the one who asks.

Lord Jesus, I know that I lack humility. It's hard for me to admit when I'm wrong, and I often pretend to be smarter than I am. All because of the fear of losing power and position in the eyes of other people. Please take this fear away from me. Amen.

The Epiphany of Our Lord

The word "epiphany" comes from the Greek epiphainen, a verb that means "to shine upon." "to manifest," or "to make known." Thus, the feast of the Epiphany celebrates the many ways that Christ has made Himself known to the world, mainly the three events that manifested the mission and divinity of Christ: the visit of the Magi (Matthew 2:1-12), the baptism of Jesus (Mark 1:9-11), and the miracle at Cana (John

Today we bless incense and chalk. After returning home from the church. we use the chalk to mark the door of our home with the initials of the names of the Wise Men and the year 2023.

You may also write C + M + B(Christus Mansoni Benedicat) which means "May Christ bless this house."

The letters on the door are a visible sign that a Christian family lives in the house.

2022 Parish Statistics

Ten Surprising Effects of Frequent Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament

8. We notice that God has a sense of humour

The more time we spend with God and let Him talk to us, the more we discover that God has a great sense of humor. And it doesn't manifest itself in mystical experience but in subtle everyday signs which will be evident to someone who lives by prayer, who is in a relationship with Jesus or strives for it. It is not literally seeing God tell jokes or hearing His inner voice. It's more about renewed attention to the things of life, to events and God's calls in our conscience (not inner voices). So, more humility and less fascination with supernatural events or visions! Saint John of the Cross, a true mystic, teaches that a soul that wants to be united with God shouldn't seek supernatural consolations or visions. Saint Teresa of Avila echoes his words. She says that if the soul craves many supernatural experiences, it will become barren. It is also worth noting that true mystics do not boast about their supernatural experiences, and they certainly don't shout it from the rooftops. Therefore, let us follow the advice of the saints who have walked the path to God before us. They did not look for sensations, but strived to see God in ordinary, everyday things. What greater miracle could there be? This is the highest form of spirituality to which we should aspire.
